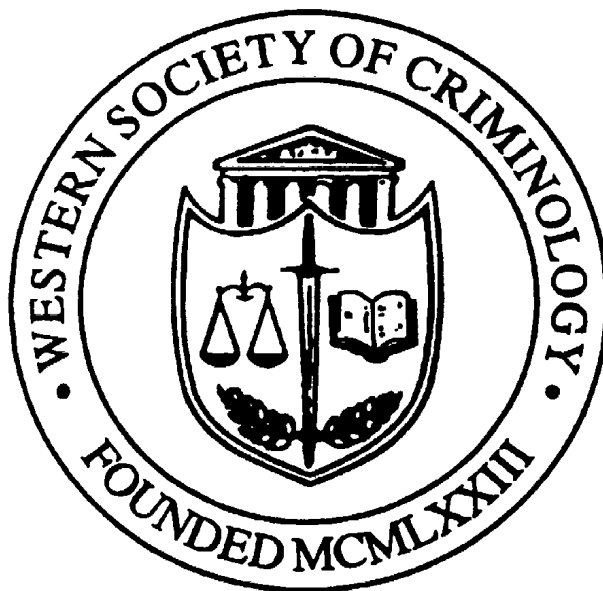

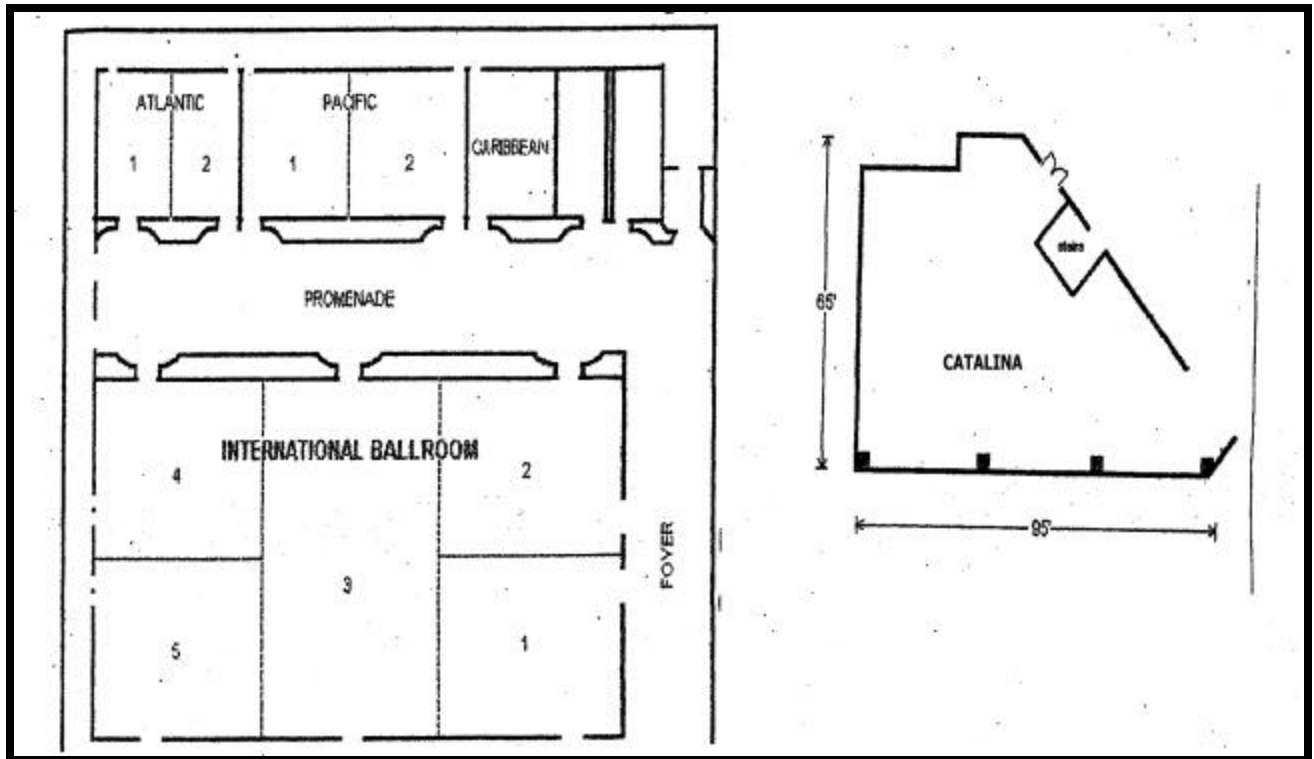

Paul Tappan Award for outstanding contributions to the field of criminology:

M. Douglas Anglin, UCLA Integrated Substance Abuse Programs. Doug Anglin (Ph.D. UCLA in Psychology, 1980) is an Associate Director of UCLA ISAP. Dr. Anglin has been conducting research on substance abuse epidemiology, natural history, treatment, and policy since 1972 and is author or co-author of more than 200 articles. He has been Project Director or Principal Investigator on over 30 federally funded studies. Dr. Anglin has served as an advisor to many prominent evaluation studies, including the Drug Abuse Treatment Outcome Study and the Federal Bureau of Prisons Drug Programs Evaluation Project. He has also served as consultant to the following agencies: National Institute on Drug Abuse, Office of National Drug Control Policy, Center for Substance Abuse Treatment, National Academy of Sciences Institute of Medicine, National Institute of Justice, California Department of Corrections, California Youth Authority, California Office of Criminal Justice Planning, California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs, and Los Angeles County Alcohol and Drug Programs Administration.

Joseph D. Lohman Award for outstanding service to the Western Society of Criminology:

Libby Deschenes, California State University, Long Beach. Libby Deschenes received her Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Pennsylvania and is a Professor in the Criminal Justice Department at CSULB. Prior to joining the faculty, she worked for URSA Institute on the Violent Juvenile Offender Project, for UCLA's Drug Abuse Research Center on studies of narcotic addicts, and as a consultant to RAND's Criminal Justice Program. She has conducted evaluations of various correctional programs, including juvenile and adult drug courts, intensive supervision programs, residential and intensive aftercare programs for juvenile delinquents, and court-supervised drug testing and treatment for probationers. She has over 36 publications in various journals and books in the criminal justice or substance use field and is editor of *Crime and Delinquency*. She has served on the WSC Executive Board since 1998.

Sabra Horne, Wadsworth Publishing, Senior Executive Editor, Criminal Justice & Criminology. Having worked in the field of higher educational publishing for over 16 years, Ms. Horne has focused her work in the area of criminal justice education for the last ten years. Hired in 1993 to oversee the Wadsworth publishing program in Teacher Education in 1993, she took on the additional publishing program in Criminal Justice and Criminology, a \$2 million list, in 1994. In the subsequent years, the Wadsworth Criminal Justice list has grown to the premier academic textbook list in the discipline, with over 200 published titles and annual revenue of over \$16 million. Her personal interests in having sound research inform criminal justice policy have shaped the Wadsworth list.

June Morrison-Tom Gitchoff Founders Award for significant improvement of the quality of justice:

The Honorable Leonard Edwards, Santa Clara County Superior Court. The Honorable Leonard Edwards is a Superior Court Judge in Santa Clara County. Graduating with a law degree from the University of Chicago, Judge Edwards has served on the bench since 1980. Judge Edwards has authored two books, including the 1995 *Child Abuse and the Legal System*, as well as numerous articles. Over the years, Judge Edwards has been recognized for his leadership ability and his efforts on the part of juveniles.

The Honorable Wendy Lindley, Orange County Superior Court. The Honorable Wendy Lindley, who received her law degree from Pepperdine, has been a judge in the County of Orange, California since 1994, but started her career in the District Attorney's Office in 1989. A leader in the collaborative courts movement, she started a drug court in Orange County in 1994, a dual diagnosis court, and most recently a specialized court for the homeless. Judge Lindley is co-chair of the Orange County Community Court Project, a member of the AOC Drug Court Oversight Committee, serves on the Orange County Coalition for Mental Health Services, and has held many other leadership positions including Vice President of the California Association of Drug Court Professionals and Vice Chair of the Orange County Family Violence Council. She has lectured for the National Association of Drug Court Professionals and has received many awards for her community service.

W.E.B. DuBois Award for significant contributions to the field of racial and ethnic issues in Criminology:

Cassia C. Spohn, University of Nebraska, Omaha. Cassia Spohn received a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The author of three books, her research interests include the effect of race and gender on court processing decisions, the effect of victim characteristics on sexual assault case outcomes, and charging and sentencing decisions under the federal sentencing guidelines.
