Therapeutic Jurisprudence Sessions

We are pleased to announce that at this year's WSC conference, there will be a stream of therapeutic jurisprudence panels throughout both days of sessions. The co-founders of therapeutic jurisprudence, Bruce Winick and David Wexler, will both be in attendance, along with 15 additional legal professionals and social science researchers, including acclaimed judges Leonard Edwards, Michael Town, and Peggy Hora. We will have seven consecutive panels on therapeutic jurisprudence that highlight current scholarship and practice principles. We invite you to attend these sessions.

Therapeutic Jurisprudence Defined

Therapeutic jurisprudence is the "study of the role of the law as a therapeutic agent." It focuses on the law's impact on emotional life and on psychological well-being. It is a mental health approach to law that uses the tools of the behavioral sciences to assess the law's therapeutic impact, and when consistent with other important legal values, to reshape law and legal processes in ways that can improve the psychological functioning and emotional well-being of those affected. These are areas that have not received very much attention in the law until now. Therapeutic jurisprudence focuses our attention on this previously underappreciated aspect, humanizing the law and concerning itself with the human, emotional, psychological side of law and the legal process. Therapeutic jurisprudence does not support paternalism or coercion. It is simply a way of looking at the law in a richer way, through legal analyses and interdisciplinary research, and then bringing to the table some of these areas and issues that previously have gone unnoticed.
